A few ideas that may help:

- 3) Try the following

any and **many**: These two words are difficult because the **a** sounds like **e**. Highlight the **a** and try either mispronouncing the word, using Spelling Speak, or a mnemonic such as

any naughty yaks (and draw a picture to go with it)

magic: Remind your child that, "i, y and e make a softy out of g." As the g is followed by i, it makes a soft j sound, but it spells with g. For **magician**, the **cian**, sounding like 'shun', can cause problems. Tell your child that all magicians are called **ian**!

magic-ian

ask: Have a laugh trying out northern and southern accents to say this word. It is easier for the northerners – the southerners tend to pronounce it as 'arsk'. If your child likes mnemonics, try

ask: a silly king

hundred and **thousand**: These words need to be spoken very clearly in their syllables, so that they are phonetic.

hun-dred thou-sand

thirteen and **thirty**: From level 8, your child knows how to spell '**third**'. These numbers all contain the digit 3, and all spell with **ir**.

twelve: If your child sometimes forgets the final **e**, remind them that English words never end with a **v** because the letter **v** is balancing on its point and it will fall over. If **v** is the last sound in a word, you must prop it up with an **e**.

twenty and **forty**: If your child spells the final **y** as an **e**, remind them that **e** on the end of a word is usually silent (but doing its job of changing the sound of the preceding vowel). The **ee** sound on the end of words is almost always **y**, as in mummy and happy. **Forty** may cause difficulties because the **for** part spells differently from **four**.
